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This conference provides a practical and useful update for primary care and subspecialty physicians, nurses, and other health care professionals caring for children, youth, and adults with complex health care needs and developmental disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders. This year's conference features select topics addressing issues of dual diagnosis (developmental disabilities and emotional/behavioral disabilities).
