Groups are scheduled to go out in the community. If a special outing has been arranged, then money (if needed) has been requested. Vehicles have been designated and the individuals involved report to program, staff complete destination sheets, retrieve medications, sign-out and leave for the event. If the outings have not been pre-arranged, the groups meet upon arrival and discuss places they'd like to visit and go to, group members have to agree and a destination report is completed by staff and approved by case manager, medications are retrieved, and the group goes to their destinations that are planned. Individuals that stay on-site participate in daily living skills and coordinate with training that takes place in the community such as money management, self-advocacy and communication skills, the importance to speak up. Arts and craft activities class may be provided as individuals can make crafts and sell their items at craft fairs and in Anthesis Thrift store. This allows for individuals to sell their crafts and earn some money. Barriers to HCBS compliance has been the lack of funding to: provide daily entrance fees, transportation/parking costs and membership costs for program participants, BCBA professional to train with intervention in the community for difficult individuals to be successful in the community or difficult individuals to be successful in the community for difficult activities/hobbies that create happier fulfilled lives for all program participants.

Fed Req #1, 2, 4 & 5 –In order to provide meaningful activities in natural settings including non-disability specific settings and are based on the individual needs and preference, there needs to be more funding and money available to individuals to explore their communities to become members at the YMCA, to participate in the City of Montclair, Ontario, Upland sessions/classes for knitting, sewing, and computer classes, bowling leagues, Craft classes at local businesses such as Michael's, visits to Pacific of the Aquarium, Discovery Parks, etc: This would include destination of our program participants choice. The transportation cost of parking, busses, Metrolink, uber, lyft, etc. also need to be considered. Funding for on- going Person Centered Thinking training is needed for all direct care staff. All staff need the understanding of PCT, roles and responsibilities of staff in order to better support the needs and desires of the individuals we serve. Funding for an ABA, BCBA behaviorist consultant is needed to help work with staff for intervention and redirecting individuals with difficult behaviors to help our individual participants to be successful in the community.
Narrative/description of the concept; include justification for the funding request and explain how the concept would achieve proposed outcomes.	In order to truly provide community integration in non-disability specific settings, funding for memberships, entrance fees, class/activities fees, and transportation costs are needed to increase meaningful community participation. Person centered training for all staff is needed to ensure that there is a complete understanding that programming is all about the individuals needs and desires. A BCBA behaviorist consultant is needed to provide assistance to staff and program participants to ensure that an individual is successful in the community regardless of the disability and/or behavior. The funding would allow all individuals to participate in activities and have memberships equal to non-disabled individuals. There would be greater opportunities to explore and access communities for a seamless transition. There would be an understanding of behaviors and how to work with individuals in the community. The above will allow Anthesis to increase community time, participate in community classes, and provide meaningful activities/hobbies that create happier fulfilled lives for all program participants.

Please describe your person- centered approach ¹ in the concept development process; how did you involve the individuals for whom you provide services?	Anthesis is taking the person centered approach. The individual provides input of desired activities, classes, events, etc. daily and/or weekly. Schedules are built around desired activities or places to visit that individuals are interested in.
Does the concept address unmet service needs or service disparities? If so, how?	Yes, Community Integration participation and community involvement for low-income & fixed income individuals who live independently, at home or in group homes. There is a decreased time in requested activities due to funding for entrance fees and membership costs for program participants. Costs for Transportation/parking, BCBA professional to train with intervention in the community for difficult individuals, and PCT training to all staff members for programs.
