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Performance Report for North Bay Regional Center

Every year, the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) contracts with regional centers in California to serve consumers and families. And, every year DDS looks at how well the regional centers are doing. This report will give you information about your regional center.

Last year, at North Bay Regional Center (NBRC) we served about 9,420 consumers. The charts on page two tell you about the consumers we serve. You'll also see how well we are doing in meeting our goals and in fulfilling our contract with DDS.

At NBRC, we want to improve every year, do better than the state average, and meet or exceed the DDS standard. As you can see in this report, we did well or improved in the following categories:

Fewer children reside in state developmental centers

More children line with families (including own family, foster family, and/or guardian) More adults live in home settings (includes living with family, parent or conservator; adult family home agency – FHA; independent living; or supported living arrangements)

More adults reside in Independent Living arrangements

More adults reside in Supported Living arrangements

More adults reside in Family Home Agency (FHA) living arrangements

Fewer adults live in licensed homes serving more than 6 adults

Number and percent of consumers (ages 16-64) with earned income exceeds state average

Total number of \$1000, \$1250, and \$1500 incentive payments made for the fiscal year and increased from 2017

Percentage of adults reporting integrated employment as a goal in IPP Client Development Evaluation Reports (CDERs) and Early Start Reports (ESRs) are current

But, we still need to improve in the following areas:

Fewer children living in in licensed homes serving more than 6 children Intake/Assessment completed in a timely manner (240 days or less) Intake/Assessment and Individual Family Service Plans completed in a timely manner (for ages 0-2)



- 1) The federal waiver refers to the Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services Waiver program that allows California to offer services not otherwise available through the Medi-Cal program to serve people (including individuals with developmental disabilities) in their own homes and communities.
- 2) The CDER and ESR currency percentages were weighted based on the RC's Status 1 and Status 2 caseloads to arrive at a composite score.
- 3) The IFSP calculation methodology was changed from composite to average in order to more accurately reflect the RC's performance by only including children reviewed during monitoring and not all Early Start consumers.
- 4) N/A indicates that the regional center was not reviewed for the measure during the current period.

The 2019 employment data was compiled differently from previous years. To obtain these statistics, DDS provided the EDD with the names and social security numbers of individuals ages 16 and older that are Status 2. The EDD matched that information to their database and returned individual-specific wage data including employment locations, business name and type. DDS then analyzed the data for accuracy and only reported to regional centers the information deemed most accurate. Approximately 87% of the EDD data were deemed accurate enough to report with confidence.
