#### **KASEC Mission**

Korean American Special Education Center (KASEC), a non-profit organization (501(C)(3)) was founded in 2000 by a group of specialists in the fields of special education and mental health. As the first Korean-American special needs resource center in the U.S., KASEC provides comprehensive services to individuals with disabilities and their families in the Korean American community. Alleviating the cultural and language barrier, KASEC provides individualized educational, therapy and group services to the individuals with special needs or mental health issues and their family members.

Our mission is to make services more accessible and widely available for the Korean American community by offering them in Korean in a culturally sensitive setting. KASEC strives to promote accurate understanding of developmental disabilities and mental health within the Korean American community, aided by the removal of the stigma attached to seeking help for these concerns.

#### **KASEC Experience & Accomplishments**

Since 2000, KASEC has coordinated and hosted various community outreach events to raise disability awareness in the Korean community in California. These events include but not limited to KASEC Parent Education Seminars, KASEC Parent Workshops, ADHD symposiums, Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) symposiums, and Disability Conference.

All of the described community events were accomplished through KASEC's strongly established network of Korean healthcare professionals and specialists from UCLA, UCI, and CSU. In addition, KASEC has hosted 2 musical concerts to provide free entertainment for families with disabilities. Another significant accomplishment of KASEC is our quarterly magazine "Ah-Chim-Haet-Sal" which includes current issues and information about disabilities and mental health, distributed at no cost to about 1,200 households.

Currently, KASEC provides phone consultations, referrals, psychosocial intake, music therapy, play therapy, speech therapy, and individual counseling. #### **B. Project Information**

#### 1. Project title

Free Developmental & Health Screening Fair in catchment area of Lanterman Regional Center

#### 2. Describe how the target population is an underserved population.

The National Health Statistics Report (2015) estimates that 1 in 45 children have been identified with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). According to the California Department of Developmental Services, the Asian Americans constitute an estimated 9.03% of those with Autism and Pervasive Developmental Disorder (PDD) in California. This estimation is not an accurate representation of the actual number of Asian Americans with ASD and PDD for the following reasons:

- Cultural stigmatism regarding disabilities lead many families to hide the disabilities.
- Due to language barriers, many families are not able to participate in surveys resulting in non-receipt of relevant services.
- Some families focus on economic survival rather than seeking disability and support services.
- Immigrations status of some families dissuade them from requesting services.

Therefore, the Asian American population with disabilities could be underestimated or misrepresented in most statistical data.

Our project aims to assist the Korean-American population by providing direct access to bilingual information and services. With the growing Korean-American immigrant population in the Greater Los Angeles area, our objective is to make information and services more accessible by offering information and services in Korean.

We have been focused on serving the Korean-American population who are at a disadvantage due to cultural and language barriers. From infants to adults, all who are in need of bilingual services receive help through our special education services, therapy, and resources. Below is a summary of the population served in 2016:






We have learned that most Korean-American parents were receiving their child's developmental disability assessment information for the first time ever. A survey showed that 84% of families speak only Korean, 87% of families are simply uninformed about where or who to contact regarding their child's development concern. Out of those who responded, only 35% of families reported that their main sources for information were from experts.


## 2015~2017 Survey Result

**3. Describe the project and its goals/objectives.** \*Complete the Schedule of Development/Activities Worksheet (Attachment C) and include with your application.

Research shows that when children with developmental delays or disabilities begin receiving therapeutic services at an early age, it is more effective as well as saves time and treatment cost. To implement the results of the study, we sponsor a free developmental and health screening event for children aged five and under.

1) During the event, each child will be screened in the following seven areas: **Hearing, Dental, Vision, Social & Emotional Health, Fine Motor, Gross Motor, Speech and Language.** Each screening station is staffed by highly qualified early intervention specialists.

Following the screening, a one-on-one consultation in Korean or English is available to answer any questions regarding the child's development and/or diagnosis. Our hope is to be able to offer information and description of available services to those who may not have had prior access due to their language barrier.

Upon request, specialist referrals, steps for requesting no-cost bilingual services and/or translation/interpretation services will be offered. There is a growing need within this community for information regarding eligibility and application for services offered through the Regional Centers. We would like to bridge the gap by disseminating information in their native language, while being culturally sensitive to their needs and expectations.

- 2) Rest of the fair offers, fun and educational activities related to physical and mental health.
- 3) Post-event follow-up to ensure that families are accessing appropriate services and respond further need for assistance and education.

Follow-up consultation will be done by developmental pediatrician 1 on 1 basis.

- 6 –week Parent education will be done by each area specialist and will consist of 6 topics as show below.
- 1) What is Autism?
- 2) Regional Center Services
- 3) Special Education and school System
- 4) What is Speech Therapy
- 5) What is Occupational Therapy
- 6) Other helpful community resources

#### 4. How will the project address and incorporate the input of the community it aims to serve?

Currently, KASEC is the only Disabilities and Special Education Resource Center in the country that provides bilingual services in Korean and English, such as therapy (i.e. play, music, speech and language), consultation, and information pertaining to developmental, emotional disabilities, and ADHD. For the past 17 years, we have serviced countless and growing number of families seeking information and resources available in Korean via e-mail, phone and in-person.

Since 2013, we have conducted annual screening events in Orange County by partnering with Family Support Network, Center for Autism and Neurodevelopmental Disorders, and Regional Center of Orange County. Through these events, we have discovered that the Korean American population lack information regarding developmental disabilities mainly due to cultural and language barriers. Although we were able to make many referrals to the Regional Centers, lack of bilingual services is an ongoing obstacle for the community.

A larger Korean-American population in Los Angeles County lack the resources nor access to information regarding developmental disabilities. To meet this demand, we have utilized private grant funding for the past 3 years to sponsor an annual Health Screening Event in Los Angele County by partnering with Regional Centers.

The data gathered from Korean American communities within Los Angeles and Orange County areas, lends valuable information regarding the needs of this community. As an independent non-profit organization, we create and maintain valuable relationships not only with the regional centers, but also with other non-profit organizations, such as Asian Pacific Islander with Disabilities of California, Korean American Health Coalition, service providers and schools unrelated to local regional centers. We participate in conferences and fairs of these respective organizations to further improve efficacy and effectiveness of our outreach and service coordination. Through our proposed event, we strive to fill the gap by raising awareness in the Korean American community and through bringing these organizations together in one place to ease the access to more culturally and linguistically sensitive services.

Due to insufficient funding, we were limited in hosting this event to once a year in the Los Angeles area. With the receipt of this grant, we would like to expand this screening program by increasing the frequency and providing more thorough follow-up to the participants subsequent to the event.
