Founded in 1996, PTN is a nationally and internationally recognized nonprofit therapeutic and early childhood development center committed to providing comprehensive early intervention programs and innovative therapies to children with and at-risk for developmental delays, disabilities and medical conditions throughout Los Angeles County. The mission of PTN is to lead the way in helping children, families and communities reach full capabilities through innovative therapy, education, and research programs. PTN provides services to approximately 2,500 children annually with a staff of 175.

PTN's primary goal is to establish a solid foundation for each child's growth and development by enhancing functional abilities and fostering independence through therapeutic and educational programs. To accomplish this goal, PTN offers a variety of targeted innovative therapeutic interventions and programs including: Early Intervention, Early Head Start, Early Start Denver Model, Social Skills and Community Integration, Individual Therapy, and Camp Escapades.

Over the past two decades, PTN has not only established itself as a leading provider of early intervention and therapeutic services in Los Angeles County, but has also become recognized as a trusted partner to the families we serve. We collaborate with more than a dozen child- and family-focused organizations, including Harbor Regional Center (HRC), Women Infants and Children (WIC), LA County Policy Roundtable for Child Care and

Development, First 5LA, Center for Nonprofit Management, University of Southern California, UCLA, local school districts, Long Beach Early Intervention Council, Long Beach Early Childhood Education Committee, and 211LA as well as health care providers (primary care, vision, dental, hearing) and others. Through these partnerships and collaborations PTN provides early intervention and therapeutic services to children throughout Los Angeles County and ensures the children and families served are connected to the resources and support they need.

PTN's staff reflects the diversity of our client population which is 41% Hispanic, 23% African American, 16% Asian/Pacific Islander, and 12% Caucasian. Children birth to age 5 account for approximately 57% of PTN's client population. By engaging families early and collaborating with HRC to help families better understand their child's strengths and areas of need, empower them through education and support, and encourage them to access and utilize needed services offered through the Regional Center, the proposed program will have a significant and lasting impact on long-term outcomes—helping children and families reach their fullest potential.

B. Project Information

1. Project title

Parent Engagement Through Education and Support

2. Describe how the target population is an underserved population.

PTN's Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program will serve parents and caregivers of children ages 0-5 with or at-risk for developmental delays and disabilities throughout PTN's and HRC's service catchment area which includes the South Bay as well as the Harbor, Long Beach and Bellflower regions of Southeast Los Angeles County. In this region 40% of children are Hispanic/Latino, 26% are Caucasian, 13% are Asian/Pacific Islander, and 12% are African American.

The target population will include African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander families identified by HRC, as well as those enrolled in PTN's Early Intervention and Early Head Start programs. The program aims to assist HRC in reducing identified disparities among the African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander populations related to: 1) lack of understanding of HRC services; 2) low authorization of POS; and 3) low utilization of POS.

HRC has identified 58 African American families, 87 Hispanic, bi-lingual, Spanish-speaking families, and 12 Asian/Pacific Islander, bi-lingual/monolingual families that are considered low-authorization or low-utilization POS families who will constitute a portion

of the target population.

In addition, PTN's Early Head Start program serves approximately 195 pregnant mothers and children birth to age three annually. Among these families, 100% live at or below the Federal Poverty Line (FPL) within HRC's service area and approximately 75% are Hispanic, 3% are African American and 2% are Asian/Pacific Islander. The program will target PTN's EHS families, serving as a bridge to: 1) increase awareness of HRC services among low-income African American, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islander families; and 2) to increase access to HRC services among this demographic not currently served by HRC.

Lastly, PTN's early intervention program, Leaps & Bounds, serves an estimated 350 children with and at-risk for developmental delays and disabilities each year. This service population includes approximately 100 children from the Medically Underserved Area of Long Beach. The program will again serve as a bridge to increase understanding of HRC services and encourage access to services for families in need among early intervention participants, and it will help existing HRC clients referred to PTN for early intervention further engage in the authorization and utilization of HRC services.

Through targeted outreach and marketing strategies, along with multi-lingual educational trainings and topic-specific parent support groups, the Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program is expected to reach more than 700 underserved parents and caregivers, community providers and other stakeholders throughout Southeast Los Angeles County annually.

3. Describe the project and its goals/objectives. *Complete the Schedule of Development/Activities Worksheet (Attachment C) and include with your application.

The Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program is a multifaceted collaborative approach to increasing awareness of resources available to young children and families with and at-risk for developmental delays and disabilities throughout Southeast Los Angeles County that strives to improve access to and utilization of HRC POS. The goal of the program is to address disparities identified by HRC among African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander families related to: 1) lack of understanding of HRC services; 2) low authorization of POS; and 3) low utilization of POS.

By increasing awareness of HRC services through targeted outreach and marketing directly to underserved communities as well as to PTN's and HRC's network of community providers, and by providing families with access to regular, relevant and culturally-responsive educational trainings and informational support groups, parents and

caregivers will gain a better understanding of HRC services, what they qualify for, and how to utilize those services.

The overall objectives of the Program include: 1) Increasing understanding of HRC services among parents and caregivers of children ages 0-5 in the communities served by HRC throughout Southeast Los Angeles County, primarily among African Americans as well as Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islanders; 2) Increasing the authorization of POS among HRC identified low authorization African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander families with children ages 0-5; 3) Increasing the utilization of POS among HRC identified low utilization African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander families with children ages 0-5; 4) Providing parents and caregivers of children ages 0-5 with knowledge, skills, confidence and support they need to access available resources and needed services; and 5) Improving communication and service delivery between and among HRC, PTN and families by creating and administering a Family Needs Assessment for parents and caregivers of early intervention program participants to identify barriers to accessing care and inform future program and service needs for African American, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander families.

The Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program consists of three primary components: Outreach, Education and Support.

Outreach efforts will be dedicated to reaching underserved families throughout the communities served by HRC as well as promoting the Program to community stakeholders such as PTN Board of Directors, Medical Advisory Council and local state officials, as well as community providers on the front line who often are the first to identify developmental delays or disabilities in young children. This includes physicians, WIC staff, early care and education providers, Head Start and Early Head Start staff, etc. Outreach efforts will include: identifying and informing 157 prospective parents and caregivers of low utilization/low authorization African American, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islander HRC families of the Program's educational trainings and support groups; providing a minimum of 20 community providers with information about the Program and training calendar; and adapting PTN's existing mandatory bi-monthly Early Intervention Parent Orientation curriculum and Early Head Start intake assessment to include bi-lingual information about HRC services and the program activities.

Parent Education Trainings will be formal topic-specific trainings led by guest speakers and subject experts geared towards providing parents and caregivers with relevant information to navigate the complex and often bureaucratic health care, education and service systems, as well as addressing barriers to accessing services. Parent Support

Groups will be more informal topic-specific sessions led by PTN, HRC staff and guest speakers dedicated to providing parents and caregivers with information and facilitated discussions about stress, anxiety and other challenges as well as information about community resources.

PTN and HRC will develop a culturally-responsive, engaging and relevant training and support group curriculum that includes guest speakers from PTN and HRC as well as subject experts. Sample Educational Training topics may include: Understanding a Diagnosis, Understanding Regional Center and Early Intervention (Early Start), How to Address Difficult Behaviors in My Child, Transitions Without Tears (preschool/kindergarten versions), ABC's of the IFP, IPP and IEP, Trauma and Stress—Removing Barriers to Services. Sample Support Group Session topics may include: How to Communicate with Healthcare Professionals to Promote Understanding, Building Your Resource Binder, Past Parent Perspectives (with parents of former PTN clients and/or current HRC clients age 5+), and What to Ask HRC/Doctor/School etc.

Trainings and Support Groups will be provided at no cost, and offer childcare services and meals. All sessions will be translated into Spanish via a two-way headset system that allows Spanish-speaking participants to engage directly through the on-site translator, and all materials will be provided in English and Spanish. A minimum of 1/3 of the Parent Education Trainings and 1/4 of Parent Support Groups will be provided off-site at community-based locations throughout HRC service area. A minimum of 90% of Parent Education Training attendees will report a greater understanding of the training topic; and approximately 80% of Parent Support Group attendees will report gaining knowledge of a minimum of one new resource and/or making a connection with another parent/caregiver facing similar circumstances.

As a community provider with a long history of supporting the whole family, PTN is highly respected and trusted not only within the professional community, but also among the parents and caregivers of the children we serve. Because of this positive reputation and our existing relationship with parents as a partner, PTN has a unique opportunity to assist HRC in reducing disparities, improving access to needed services and enhancing outreach to underrepresented populations.

PTN and HRC anticipate the following outcomes: 700 parents, caregivers and community stakeholders will receive information about HRC services, including a minimum of 15 HRC identified low utilization/low authorization families; 100% of HRC low utilization and/or low authorization families will receive targeted marketing and outreach, with a goal of 10% attending a minimum of 1 training or support event; 10% of HRC identified low

utilization/low authorization families will increase authorization and/or utilization of POS.

4. How will the project address and incorporate the input of the community it aims to serve?

To address and incorporate the input of the community PTN and HRC aim to serve, the Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program will implement the use of a Family Needs Assessment as part of its early intervention individualized intake process. This assessment will ask a series of questions regarding areas where parents/caregivers face barriers to accessing care and areas or resources they would like more information about. The Family Needs Assessment data will be used to identify specific families for targeted marketing and outreach around educational and support trainings geared towards their identified areas of need. The data will also be utilized to determine future training and support group topics as the year progresses and in future years. The Family Needs Assessments will also be shared with HRC so that they can gain greater insights into the challenges and barriers our families face, and work within the HRC system to implement programs or increase access to services in need.

In addition, PTN will administer parent/caregiver feedback and evaluation surveys at each Parent Educational Training and Parent Support Group. The surveys will ask questions regarding knowledge gained as well as the relevance of the topic to their needs. The survey will also request feedback regarding the usefulness of information shared and provide an opportunity for suggested future topics. This information will also be used to inform future programming later in the year and future years.

PTN and HRC will measure the effectiveness of the program through the collection of both qualitative and quantitative data.

PTN will track:

- The number of presentations/outreach conducted with community providers/stakeholders (Board of Directors, PTN Medical Advisory Board, local providers, community stakeholders, EHS Health Advisory Council, other EHS and Head Start programs as well as local state officials such as State Senator Ben Allen and Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi)
- The number of marketing touch points including number of e-blasts, flyers printed/locations posted, social media posts
- The number of parents/caregivers receiving information about HRC services through the monthly Early Intervention Parent Orientation
- The number of parents/caregivers receiving information about HRC services through EHS initial intake assessments

- The number of parents/caregivers receiving information about HRC services through attending monthly Parent Education Trainings
- The number of parents/caregivers receiving information about HRC services through attending Parent Support Groups
- The number of HRC identified low utilization and low authorization families attending Parent Education Trainings and Parent Support Groups

- Number of African American, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islander families with low authorization and low utilization
- Increases in authorization among the target population
- Increases in utilization among the target population

In addition, as mentioned above, PTN will administer Parent Education Training/Parent Support Group surveys to measure:

- Increase in confidence navigating the health care, education and service systems, as well as addressing barriers to accessing services
- Identification of community providers available
- Identification of peer supports

There will also be space on the surveys to provide feedback statements about the training/support group sessions and additional space to make recommendations for future training/support group topic sessions.

6. Where will your project be implemented (counties, cities, neighborhoods, etc.)?

The Parent Engagement Through Education and Support Program will be implemented in communities served by HRC with the majority of activities and training sessions taking place at PTN's facilities in Torrance and Long Beach. Select trainings will be held at various locations throughout HRC's service area in conjunction with HRC partner organizations. These site locations have not yet been determined but will focus on communities with high populations of African American, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific families
