I. Background

The Department of Developmental Services (Department) has statutory responsibility to ensure that individuals with developmental disabilities live in the least restrictive setting, appropriate to their needs. Under the authority of Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) Sections 4418.25 and Section 4679 [Enclosure A], the Department shall establish policies and procedures for the development and submission of annual Community Placement Plan (CPP) and Community Resource Development Plan (CRDP) funding proposals by regional centers.

II. Goals

The Department's goals for the CPP and the CRDP is to be responsive to the changing needs of individuals receiving services through California's developmental disabilities services system and enhance the capacity for community services.

The CPP and CRDP are designed to support three of the Department's goals:

Goal One: *Expand the availability, accessibility and types of services and supports to meet current and future needs of individuals and their families in the community.*

Goal Two: *Develop systems to ensure that quality services and supports, in the least restrictive environment, are provided to individuals in the community.*

Goal Three: *Develop services that are person-centered, specialized and represent cultural and linguistic diversity throughout the regional center's catchment area.*

III. Priorities

Proposals submitted by the regional center should be driven by the outcomes of annual comprehensive and updated assessments of individuals residing at Porterville Developmental Center (PDC), Canyon Springs, a Stabilization, Training, Assistance and Reintegration (STAR) home, an Institution for Mental Diseases (IMD), or out-of-state, and the current and emerging needs of their community. The proposals must reflect collaborative efforts between the regional center(s), the individual and his or her family, PDC or Canyon Springs, and the regional resource development project, with consideration of stakeholder input. The Department encourages collaborative proposals

between two or more regional centers to develop specialized resources to meet the statewide needs of individuals who have challenging service needs. Regional centers shall ensure that proposed and approved projects include principles of person-centered service planning and that funded services are culturally and linguistically appropriate to the population served by the regional center. [WIC Section 4679(a)]

The Department's statewide priorities for development of the CPP include the following:

- Development of safety net, crisis, and support services;
- Meeting individual and community needs for developing specialized services, including regional community services for individuals with challenging service needs, as well as the needs of our aging population;
- Development and/or identification of community living options and other resources for individuals residing at or transitioning from PDC, STAR homes, Canyon Springs, IMDs, Safety Net facilities, out-of-state and crisis services, consistent with comprehensive assessments (see Section IV. B.);
- Development of resources that will not deny admission to individuals with challenging needs and/or in crisis;
- Development of Community Crisis Homes for adults and children;
- Development of residential and non-residential services that provide competency training for individuals who are Incompetent to Stand Trial, including development of residential options designed with a competency training component in homes with Delayed Egress and a Secured Perimeter (DESP) [H&S Code Section 1531.15];
- Requirement to demonstrate the proposed project will be in compliance with the Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Final Rule.

The Department's statewide priorities for development of the CRDP include:

- Regional centers establishing priorities that reflect how individual and community needs are incorporated in CRDP funding proposals;
- Continued focus on supporting individuals in their homes, with alternative options when not feasible;
- Development of resources reflective of a regional center's community needs, based on data and community input from stakeholder community engagement;
- Development of resources (may include technology and/or equipment) and opportunities to access resources to reduce disparity between populations, and enables individuals to access and benefit from the services;
- Evaluating the inventory of consumer crisis services such as mobile crisis teams and/or wrap around services;
- Development of service options that align with community needs, but not limited to:
 - Specialized residential options for adolescents or adults with unique medical and/or challenging services needs
 - Affordable housing
 - Employment
 - Mental health services and supports, when generic resources are not able to meet individual needs
 - Early Intervention Services
 - Specialized dental services not covered by generic resources
- Requirement to demonstrate the proposed project will be in compliance with the Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Final Rule.
