

Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Rules DEPARTMENT FUNDING GUIDANCE

The Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) rules ensure that people with disabilities have full access to, and enjoy the benefits of, community living through long-term services and supports in the most integrated settings of their choosing. In order to assist in determining eligibility for compliance funding, providers must complete this evaluation. Both “Yes” and “No” answers require an explanation. A “No” response *could* mean a service setting is out of compliance with the HCBS rules and is potentially eligible for funding to make necessary adjustments. Once this evaluation is completed, it should act as a guide for filling out the provider compliance funding concept, which is required for any provider to be eligible for compliance funding. **Completion of this evaluation is for the sole purpose of applying for compliance funding and does not take the place of future provider assessments that the Department may require to determine provider compliance with the HCBS settings rules. Only providers requesting compliance funding need to complete this evaluation.**

Federal Requirements #1-5 apply to providers of all services, including residential and non-residential settings. Federal Requirements #6-10 are additional requirements that apply only to provider-owned or controlled residential settings.

The column labeled “Guidance” contains a series of questions intended to help identify compliance or non-compliance with each requirement as it relates to the HCBS rules. While responses to these questions can help in the determination of whether or not a particular requirement is met, these responses may not be the sole factor in this determination.

The lack of an Activity Area that is connected to the house limits the residents' freedom to move about outside of the home. Also, when the weather is bad, the residents have limited space to move around in the existing living area. There is no space to various social and recreational activities such as singing, dancing, or performing physical exercises such as yoga, stretching, and Zumba. This was particularly challenging last year and this year when the carehome was under lockdown/stay-at-home orders and clients were unable to go to their usual community outings due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. Meanwhile, there is a need to construct a concrete ramp to enable consumers to age in place at the facility. Some of the consumers use mobility aids such as walker, cane, and wheelchair so there is a need to construct a concrete ramp for safety and accessibility.

<p>Sunrise RCH is a licensed 6-bed adult residential facility with a service level of 4-1. The licensee is Aurora Mendoza, while the administrator is Christia Mendoza-Vasquez. Consumers have developmental, behavioral, and medical conditions that make community participation and integration activities challenging, especially with the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic.</p> <p>The carehome lacks an Activity Area that is connected to the house that will provide space and freedom for residents to move about outside of the home. When the weather is bad, the residents have limited space to move around in the existing living area. There is not enough space to do various social and recreational activities such as singing, dancing, or performing physical exercises such as yoga, stretching, and Zumba. #1: Sunrise 1 provides and supports engagement in community life through person-centered social and recreational activities. However, not all activities are 100% person-centered and HCBS compliant. There is need for a continuous person-centered practices (PCP) consultant to ensure 100% compliance and consistency until March 2023.

#1: The person-centered practices (PCP) consultant will ensure 100% compliance and consistency to PCP principles and HCBS final rules by March 2023.

#2: The new Activity Area will provide more privacy and space so residents will have better outdoor and indoor living spaces leading to a better quality of life.

#5: PCP consultant will ensure an effective and efficient transition to person-centered residential services that align to HCBS standards.

#7: The Activity Area will allow for privacy, more space for social/recreational/physical activities as well as better living arrangements per clients' preferences and needs.

#10: The new Activity Area will allow more freedom and space for residents to move about inside the home. The ramp will enable consumers to age in place at the facility as they change status eventually from ambulatory to non-ambulatory due to old age and changing health status. Some of the consumers use mobility aids such as walker, cane, and wheelchair so the ramp will facilitate better safety and accessibility.

Proposed Outcome: The PCP consultant hours and construction of new ramp and spacious Activity Area will allow for an effective and sustainable transition to person-centered services.

Methods of tracking: data collection, consumer's quarterly reports, documentation of progress based on IPP goals/objectives

The administrator conducted several meetings with the residents as well as DSPs to assess residents' current needs and preferences.

The use of PCP consultancy hours and construction of new ramp and Activity Area will allow for an effective and sustainable transition to person-centered services by March 2023.

The carehome will ensure maintenance and upkeep of the new client Activity Area and ramp at all times. The carehome will continue to utilize PCP consultation until 100% compliance is achieved.

The carehome was approved for a new passenger van and Person-Centered training for staff. A new passenger van has been bought and currently being used. Staff training has been conducted.

The previous approved funding focused on the purchase of a new passenger van and staff training. The current funding request (PCP consultation and the construction of a new Activity Area and ramp) focuses on new concepts that were not funded by previously approved grants.
