EC-PCPT (2018/19): The Early Childhood Person-Centered Practice Project was created to impact disparities in POS authorizations and utilization by families with children leaving Early Start and entering the Lanterman systems of lifelong supports. Eastern Los Angeles FRC established a collaborative group with other parent (to parent) serving organizations in the Eastern Los Angeles Regional Center Catchment Area 1. Provided mentor organizations with basic and instructional knowledge needed to implement trainings –1 PCP training and 2 follow-up "train the trainer" meetings were held on the curriculum (PPP) with coaching and training practice. 2. 17 parent trainings were conducted by Fiesta Educativa, Chinese Parents Association for the Disabled and ELAFRC. 3. Created training manuals in English, Spanish, Chinese and Vietnamese All activities were completed. GROWN: Grassroots Organizing Working Network (East LA) was created to impact disparities in POS authorizations by increasing awareness of regional center services at the grassroots level. 3 mentees were recruited representing the Native population, Parents of young adults with complex medical issues, and individuals with disabilities normalizing sexuality and LGBTQ expression. 1. The most memorable impact story from one of our PCPT trainings is of a young family who attended the training where both parents were able to attend because we provided childcare. The parents were very interested and excited in all of the trainings although it was obvious that the Mother was not feeling well. The next day she called to say she was very ill but spent the whole day completing her son's one-page profile! She sent it to us later that week. She said she had already shared it at her son's transition IEP, with the Regional Center, and the nursing service provider. We have had many similar stories from other parents. We believe from the parent comments in evaluation that these are the significant qualitative data indicative of impact for families: 1. Parents learn to put their child's issues in a positive way; and 2. Parents know more about their child's perspective (likes and dislikes) The PCP curriculum/PPT was published with a validated translation of Spanish, Chinese as well as Vietnamese (unvalidated). Our GROWN project is set to conclude December 31, 20202.

Explain why these objectives have not	The GROWN project's objective is to train parent-led organizations to inform, educate, and train parents to use their knowledge of their child to lead to better outcomes in their child's life by using Person Centered Practice. A challenge that remains has been to address is finding a Vietnamese parent group with which to partner for parent trainings. We eventually abandon our attempts to find an organization. Conversations with stakeholders from Eastern Los Angeles to Orange county admit that there is a lack of a consistent organization that provides family support to the Vietnamese community. In preparation for continued work, the materials translated into Vietnamese, including the trainer's manual in the event we can partner after the close of the project. We would seek to develop a resource for Vietnamese families to provide the trainings. Our GROWN project is set to be completed 12/31/2020. So far, 3 grassroots organizations have been chosen and are currently working on developing their own projects. A training calendar has been redeveloped to be provided to the mentees. A set of monthly webinars on capacity building for non-profits and grassroots organizations will happen between now and December. All mentees have begun to work on their plan for implementation of their project while also getting training (mostly) individually for capacity building.

Target Population	Eastern Los Angeles Family Resource Center (ELAFRC) is contracted through DDS to support families birth - 3 who are using Early Start services to meet the developmental needs of their children. The families in the ELAFRC area do not have adequate support to transition from Early Start services to school based services. Existing support, the local parent training and information center for Part B serves all of Los Angeles County. We are seeking to build upon our relationships with families transitioning out of Early Start to provide support for families of school age children. Developing this curriculum will provide Latino and Vietnamese families in the Eastern Los Angeles Regional Center the ability to better advocate for the services needed from regional centers and education. With this capacity building effort, we will be able to build community interest and trust, pilot for effectiveness, and sustain at a relatively low level of cost (24-30 hours of staff resources) to support families of young children of color who transition from Early Start services to Lanterman and Part B services of IDEA.

Eastem Los Angeles Family Resource Center seeks to develop and provide an online parent education series to <i>expand parent knowledge about access to available services during transition from Part C to Part B services and to Lanterman Services</i> . This training will increase the parent's ability to understand, plan and advocate for their child to impact the positive trajectory of their child's development. The target population of the training will focus on <i>parents of children 2.5 to 8 years of age who are culturally Hispanic/Latino and Vietnamese</i> . The series of 6 (4-hour) parent trainings in English, Spanish and Vietnamese will focus on the differences between the Early Start system and the system of cross sector generic services that are available to their child with a developmental disability and how these different service systems work together to <i>provide a life for their child with</i> a disability to be similar to a child without a disability. We have extensive knowledge of best practices in training and information workshops for parents. The Family Resource Center staff is knowledgeable about best practices in family support, providing training and information to a variety of audiences, including parents who are underserved, low-income, and whose primary language is not English. To be effective, family support services must be flexible and individualized to the families or community's concerns, priorities and resources. The purpose of ELAFRC services is to enhance the capacity of the family to meet the needs of their children. Trainings are free and multilingual that includes information on community resources and how to access them. Trainings are provided to families at our offices and in the local community, including libraries and local partners' facilities, at the time and days that are best convenient for them. We serve as a neutral and reliable resource for convening people and programs in the community around key issues. Explain how the target population(s) are underserved using RC POS data or other data as supporting evidence of the disparity.	In the ELARC POS data for 2018-19 report, there continues to be disparate authorization and use of POS dollars as it relates to Asian (\$13, 957) and Latino (\$12, 468) in comparison to expenditures of White consumers (\$36,023) of all ages. Specifically as it relates to the school age years Latino consumers lag both Whites and Asians in expenditures, although Asians tend to spend less of their authorized dollars that both other groups. In regards to language, English speakers have higher authorized services than other languages, which reflects the finding of the DDS data. In regards to language for school aged consumers, Vietnamese POS expenditures are significantly low for the 4th largest population size in the catchment area. Latinos on the other hand have a population size of over 32X that of Vietnamese for that age, but they have similar utilization numbers. Race and language play a part in access to trusted communications and relationship. This project seeks to deepen trusted relationships, allow for more information to improve access and support the systems desire for more equitable services.

During our staff and community meetings we often observe issues that need solutions. We have, as a family support agency, had parents in our Spanish support groups and behavioral support groups discuss the difficulty with transition to Lanterman services and understanding the difference between regional center and school based services.

How will your project improve equity, access and reduce barriers to services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families and is sustainable?	CA DDS overarching measures to reduce disparities posits that disparities that begin among youth may compound as consumers age. Hispanic/Latino toddlers and other primary school students of color experience high levels of negative social determinants of health including the neffects of bias, income inequality, and reduced access to services. The project seeks to impact issues that reduce equity and access for Latino and Vietnamese children ages 2.5 - 8, who use the services of the regional center and their local education system, to improve their developmental outcomes. In the CA DD system, for every dollar spent on a white child (3-21 years of age) in the system, a non-white child of the same age category, receive 57 cents. If the household of the child speaks a language other than English, they only receive 82 cents for every dollar of their white counterpart. Knowledge regarding the system and programs (blend of generic and entitlement services) that exist to support children with a developmental disability is essential to improved outcomes. The CA Senate bill 75 asked that DDS provide a stakeholder workgroup for the purpose of improving the smooth transition of children from Part C services to Part B services including meeting federal guidelines and continuity of services. The most recent progress report and stakeholder recommendations from the workgroup include increased opportunities for parent education and support from the systems of supports for that training is essential. In addition, there is a call for increased alignment in Part B for family centered, person-centered, and culturally responsive services approach. Families find the differences in the three programs confusing and instead of leaning in to support their child they may be seen to back off their importance as part of the PI/IPP team. This in itself may be a culturall response but may also be a response to system pressures. Awareness of how the system works and how they can better advocate can change their child's outcomes. As the Early Start FRC serving their families, we collaborate yearly on a transition conference that has been increasingly successful. Conversations with the community services manager (Elizabeth Harrell) and the Information & Training supervisor (Roxana Ortiz). They agree that there continues to be a need for parent education for Spanish speakers and Vietnamese families. The target population is a population not previously addressed locally, but there is a high need as there is a lack of support, training and information for Latino and Vietnamese families as they move from Early Start to Lanterman services.	1

The proposed project is unique from currently funded grants because of its target population. This is an advocacy training project for parents of young children 2.5-8 years of age.
