In your answer, include how your organization used input from the community and/or target population to design the project?</p>	<p>In review of the CVRC POS data for 2019-2020 and 2021, there is no clear aggregation of data for the adult (18+) racial/ethnic populations to be served in this project because the data is presented by ages from 3-21 and 22+ as well as by race/ethnicity in those particular age categories. Hence, the data generated from the project will be able to provide a deeper picture of the adult self-advocate participants. Furthermore, the discovery process for A.S.E.A.T. will include review of adult self-advocates' ILP to ascertain services utilized and not addressed while simultaneously exploring barriers and ways to overcome them. Beyond the data, the project was inspired while attending the Bidder's Conference session and the stated need to increase self-advocacy representation on councils, committees, and boards that more adequately reflect racial/ethnic diversity. Input was received from CVRC and a parent of an adult child with a disability.</p>

If the project is similar to a currently funded grant listed on the Department's website, how is the proposed project different?</p>	<p>Applicant Response In the three meetings with CVRC staff, Rachel Hagans and Natasha Ambriz, it was stated that the A.S.E.A.T. project is innovative and unlike anything that exists in the attachment area. The project was exempt, interested, and support from CVRC staff. The project is designed for racial/ethnic populations that are underrepresented in decision-making councils, committees, and boards, and will hopefully increase the number of eligible individuals with a disability and their expenditure of services. Finally, CVRC staff stated the project is sustainable because it is applicable to individual persons regardless of they do, do not, serve on a council, committee, board. It is a project that can become vendored upon completion of the grant cycle. Hence, as a startup, it is sustainable.</p>

It will help to expose and add essential barriers to services and supports towards advancing racial and ethnic equity. Furthermore, it will help various local and state council, committee, and board seats to be filled by self-advocates that are Black, African American, Hispanic, and Native American. Finally, it will help the participants build stronger relationships in and with their communities as well as with their cultural group.</p>

How will you project collaborate with other organizations that serve individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families?</p>	<p>Applicant Response Jewel of Justice was approached by CVRC staff, Aaron Ols, prior to this funding announcement to create a training curriculum for adults with disabilities that was similar to the AAPEX training curriculum for parents with children with disabilities 3-8 years old. The timing was not right for Jewel of Justice until the DDS funding proposal became available. Thus, this project assists the RC in the following ways: 1) it focuses on providing ultimately relevant and empowering education and training for underserved racial/ethnic groups, 2) it focuses on building community connections for participants with an agency that is grounded in the community, and 3) it taps into unmet needs by using self-advocacy development for adult participants with a disability. This project is designed to promote racial equity and decrease racial disparities.</p>

Clearly and specifically state how the schedule of activities demonstrates the steps that the project will take to achieve its stated objective and measures.</p>	<p>Applicant Response The A.S.E.A.T. project's objective is to increase awareness and self-advocacy among Black, African American, and English-speaking Hispanic, and Native American adults 18+ with a disability in local and state councils, committees, and boards, and collaborating with an independent facilitator in the Self-Determination program. The following seven activities provide the necessary steps to hire (1) one full-time and (1) one part-time staff who will provide the : sessions to the self-advocate participants. Staff will be hired and trained in the first month of the grant cycle. Then, beginning March 1, 2022, staff will begin conducting referrals received from CVRC with the aim of establishing a schedule for in-home, virtual, or in-community sessions. If a community site is not secured in time for participants who desire to be trained in a community site, they will be given the option to get started with one of the other two options and then booked accordingly once the community site becomes available. Activity number three will also be a focus while recruiting, hiring, and training to insure the project has the appropriate technology for those self-advocate participants that desire virtual training. The Resources for Independence of the Central Valley (RICV) will be a primary community resource for this activity. In addition, RICV is able to assist in appropriate materials and content for the handouts to be shared with the self-advocate participants. Activity #5 is staff implementation of training from 3/01/2022 - 12/31/2022 which includes them administering and inputting pre/post program data and conducting the follow up call visit. Most of the measures are numerical and percentage although some are also qualitative/narrative in nature.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Budget Details and Restrictions are available here. 	<p>Applicant Response</p> <p>A.S.E.A.T.'s project budget is designed to seed funding for a start-up program to increase Jewel of Justice's capacity infrastructure. This budget includes hiring full and part-time personnel who bring the lived experience, educational credentials, community connections, and cultural awareness and sensitivity to the focus populations being served. The project director is the founder and CEO of Jewel of Justice and will devote 25% of time in leading this innovative and CVRC supported project. Although the project is starting within the greater Fresno area initially, we plan to expand to reach more rural areas in a next funding cycle upon vendor approval. The training will provide self-advocate participants with the materials, tools, resources, and content to speak up for themselves, and others, as well as build stronger community and cultural connections in becoming more confident and independent. The budget is designed to promote non-entered learning and empowerment while also honoring the self-advocate participants' time and achievement by granting a certificate and small award when completed. This project will help adults with a disability 18+ to have a greater awareness of their needs, supports, and services and how to get them met. They will have a better understanding of their interests, passions, and value to give as well as receive.</p>

From recruiting, hiring, and training, to securing a facility for community learning, to implementation of the training curriculum, and analysis of data, the project is cost-effective and community oriented.</p>
