The Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) rules supports people with disabilities to have full access to, and enjoy the benefits of, community living through long-term services and supports in the most integrated settings of their choosing. Completion of this concept form is for the sole purpose of applying for compliance funding and does not take the place of provider assessments or remediation that the Department has required to determine provider compliance with the HCBS settings rules.

Prior HCBS funding focused primarily on barriers to compliance with the 10 federal requirements of the HCBS Final Rule. HCBS funding for fiscal year 2021-2022 will still take the 10 federal requirements into account and will also place increased emphasis on the outcome of a provider's concept. To simplify the process, the federal requirements were placed in three categories that target similar outcomes. Those categories are Community Integration, Individual Rights, and Choice. A fourth category, Collaboration, may be used for a concept between multiple providers to develop a community resource or collaborate on a project benefiting multiple settings. The bulleted questions listed under each category are for providers to consider when thinking about their current operations and plans for the future. These questions should be used when considering ways to build a concept that will achieve increased person-centered practices ongoing.

Community Integration

How will providers support the following through their services?

Individual Rights

- Individuals having the freedom to move about inside and outside the home.
- For those requiring accessible supports, grab bars, seats in bathrooms, ramps for wheelchairs, etc., are available so that individuals can move about the setting as they choose.
- Appliances and furniture are accessible to every individual.

Choice

How will providers support the following through their services?

- Offering daily activities based on individual's needs and preferences.
- Structuring support so that individuals are able to interact with people they choose to interact with, both at home and in community settings.
- Structuring support so that individuals are able to participate in activities that interest them and correspond with their IPP goals.
- Supporting individuals in choosing which staff provide their care to the extent that alternative staff are available.
- Opportunities to modify services and/or voice concerns outside of the scheduled review of services (IPP review).
- Individuals having access to food at any time.
- Supporting individuals to set their own daily schedules.

Collaboration

HCBS Final Rule: List of Federal Requirements

Federal Requirement #1: Access to the Community

The setting is integrated in, and supports full access of individuals receiving Medicaid HCBS to the greater community, including opportunities to seek employment and work in competitive integrated settings, engage in community life, control personal resources, and receive services in the community, to the same degree of access as individuals not receiving Medicaid HCBS.

Federal Requirement #2: Choice of Setting

The setting is selected by the individual from among setting options, including nondisability-specific settings and an option for a private unit in a residential setting. The setting options are identified and documented in the person-centered service plan and are based on the individual's needs, preferences, and, for residential settings, resources available for room and board.

Federal Requirement #3: Right to be Treated Well

Ensures an individual's rights of privacy, dignity and respect, and freedom from coercion and restraint.

Federal Requirement #4: Independence

Optimizes but does not regiment individual initiative, autonomy, and independence in making life choices, including, but not limited to, daily activities, physical environment, and with whom to interact.

Federal Requirement #5: Choice of Services and Supports

Facilitates individual choice regarding services and supports, and who provides them.

For providers who operate a residential setting:

Federal Requirement #6: Residential Agreement

The unit or dwelling is a specific physical place that can be owned, rented or occupied under a legally enforceable agreement by the individual receiving services, and the individual has, at a minimum, the same responsibilities and protections from eviction that tenants have under the landlord/tenant law of the State, county, city or other designated entity. For settings in which landlord/tenant laws do not apply, the State must ensure that a lease, residency agreement or other form of written agreement will be in place for each participant and that the document provides protections that address eviction processes and appeals comparable to those provided under the jurisdiction's landlord/tenant law.

Federal Requirement #7: Privacy

- 1. Each individual has privacy in his/her sleeping or living unit:
- 2. Units have entrance doors lockable by the individual, with only appropriate staff having keys to doors as needed.
- 3. Individuals sharing units have a choice of roommates in that setting.
- 4. Individuals have the freedom to furnish and decorate their sleeping or living units within the lease or other agreement.

Federal Requirement #8: Schedule and Access to Food

Individuals have the freedom and support to control their own schedules and activities, and have access to food at any time.

Federal Requirement #9: Right to Visitors

Individuals are able to have visitors of their choosing at any time.

Federal Requirement #10: Accessibility

The setting is physically accessible to the individual.

Bright Life Care Home is a 4 bed Residential Care Facility for the Elderly. BLCH is considered a Special Residential Facility(SRF) who provide support to individuals with high medical needs. Services are provided at a 1:2 ratio. All residents receive 24 hour care which includes support with all Activities of Daily Living. Through HCBS Funding awarded in FY20-21, BLCH was able to hire a Person Centered Planning Consultant. After learning about person centered practices like The Liberty Plan or PATH, and coming into a deeper understanding of HCBS and PCP, BLCH has recognized an area where improvement is needed. This concept proposal aims to make improvements to Federal Regulation #4 (Independence) and #10 (Accessibility) Furthermore, the benefits of this concept would be seen in an increase in guality of Individual Rights and Choice. Currently the layout of the kitchen does not provide residents who use a wheelchair or walker to have equal access to all areas of the kitchen, including the refrigerator or sink. This is a barrier to independence and a residents to choice as to get a snack, meal, or drink on their own. Additionally, the hallway and master bathroom needs to be enlarged so that a wheelchair/walker can fit inside without bumping into anything which could pose a fall risk. A larger bathroom would also allow staff to fit and better support residents who need it. A participant who utilizes a walker, but can use the bathroom on her own will be able to use the bathroom independently, as they will need no assistance to walk from the bathroom door to the toilet.

BLCH is requesting HCBS Funding to remodel the shared hallway bathroom and master bathroom. The bathroom will be enlarged in order to ensure residents who need

staff assistance can be supported in a safe manner, limiting risk of falling or bumping into objects currently in the space. A larger bathroom would also benefit a specific non- ambulatory resident who would like to use the bathroom independently and privately.
BLCH is requesting funding to remodel the kitchen layout. This change will allow residents who use a wheelchair/walker to access counters, the sink and refrigerator leading to an increase in independence and choice.

 100% of BLCH residents will be able to use the bathroom in an even more safe manner, without worry of space or bumping/falling over anything. 100% of residents will have the choice to use the bathroom independently and privately. 100% of residents will be able to access the counter, sink, and refrigerator.
5. Please describe how and/or what was done to ensure that individuals served by the program led the development of this concept? Discuss not only the development of the concept, but also what steps were taken to identify the interests and desires of the individuals and who was involved in that process.
BLCH conducted a self-assessment and held conversations with residents and their support circles to identify preferences, needs, desires, goals, and areas of improvement that would have a positive effect on their quality of life. It was found that a particular resident wanted to use the bathroom on her own, but couldn't. It was also noticed, that certain residents would have to use a different sink to wash hands or ask for food, while other residents could obtain it independently.
6. Please describe how the concept you propose will enable you to provide more person- centered services to the individuals you serve.
The renovations to the bathroom would lend to more independence and safety. It would also allow a resident to use the bathroom with some privacy. Renovations to the kitchen would allow for all residents to access the counters, sink, and refrigerator to access food when they want and independently.
7. What percentage of individuals served by your program will directly benefit from implementation of this concept?
 75% of residents will directly benefit from this concept. 8. Please address your plan for maintaining the benefits, value, and success of your project at the conclusion of 2021-22 HCBS Funding.
After funding, residents will continue to have access to all areas of the home independently. They will have the choice to go to the restroom on their own or decide if they want to get food without asking for staff assistance.

Four 8-hour trainings were held in Aug/Sept with the consultant. Ongoing supervision is being held quarterly. BLCH did not receive funding for remodeling in FY20-21.

The current funding request is not redundant in that prior funding was related to hiring PCP related positions. Prior funding aimed to embedded Person Centeredness into BLCH's policies and protocols, while this current funding request aims to put Person Centeredness into action.
