The Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) rules supports people with disabilities to have full access to, and enjoy the benefits of, community living through long-term services and supports in the most integrated settings of their choosing. Completion of this concept form is for the sole purpose of applying for compliance funding and does not take the place of provider assessments or remediation that the Department has required to determine provider compliance with the HCBS settings rules.

Prior HCBS funding focused primarily on barriers to compliance with the 10 federal requirements of the HCBS Final Rule. HCBS funding for fiscal year 2021-2022 will still take the 10 federal requirements into account and will also place increased emphasis on the outcome of a provider's concept. To simplify the process, the federal requirements were placed in three categories that target similar outcomes. Those categories are Community Integration, Individual Rights, and Choice. A fourth category, Collaboration, may be used for a concept between multiple providers to develop a community resource or collaborate on a project benefiting multiple settings. The bulleted questions listed under each category are for providers to consider when thinking about their current operations and plans for the future. These questions should be used when considering ways to build a concept that will achieve increased person-centered practices ongoing.

Community Integration

How will providers support the following through their services?

- Individuals receiving services in the community based on their needs, preferences and abilities.

Individual Rights

- Informing individuals, in a manner they can understand, of their rights to privacy, dignity, respect, and freedom from coercion and restraint.
- Communication with individuals based on their needs and preferences, including alternative methods of communication where needed (e.g., assistive technology, Braille, large font print, sign language, participants' language, etc.).
- Individuals have informed consent and regular review regarding residential agreements, admission agreements, or other forms of written residency agreements.
- Individuals taking active roles in program policies and shared house rules.
- Individuals understanding of the balance between the rights they have and respecting the rights of others, building skills of negotiation.
- Individuals' understanding of the different service options available to them, and working towards individualized goals with support.

- Individuals having the freedom to move about inside and outside the home.
- For those requiring accessible supports, grab bars, seats in bathrooms, ramps for wheelchairs, etc., are available so that individuals can move about the setting as they choose.
- Appliances and furniture are accessible to every individual.

Choice

How will providers support the following through their services?

- Offering daily activities based on individual's needs and preferences.
- Structuring support so that individuals are able to interact with people they choose to interact with, both at home and in community settings.
- Structuring support so that individuals are able to participate in activities that interest them and correspond with their IPP goals.
- Supporting individuals in choosing which staff provide their care to the extent that alternative staff are available.
- Opportunities to modify services and/or voice concerns outside of the scheduled review of services (IPP review).
- Individuals having access to food at any time.
- Supporting individuals to set their own daily schedules.

Collaboration

HCBS Final Rule: List of Federal Requirements

Federal Requirement #1: Access to the Community

The setting is integrated in, and supports full access of individuals receiving Medicaid HCBS to the greater community, including opportunities to seek employment and work in competitive integrated settings, engage in community life, control personal resources, and receive services in the community, to the same degree of access as individuals not receiving Medicaid HCBS.

Federal Requirement #2: Choice of Setting

The setting is selected by the individual from among setting options, including non-disability-specific settings and an option for a private unit in a residential setting. The setting options are identified and documented in the person-centered service plan and are based on the individual's needs, preferences, and, for residential settings, resources available for room and board.

Federal Requirement #3: Right to be Treated Well

Ensures an individual's rights of privacy, dignity and respect, and freedom from coercion and restraint.

Federal Requirement #4: Independence

Optimizes but does not regiment individual initiative, autonomy, and independence in making life choices, including, but not limited to, daily activities, physical environment, and with whom to interact.

Federal Requirement #5: Choice of Services and Supports

Facilitates individual choice regarding services and supports, and who provides them.

For providers who operate a residential setting:

Federal Requirement #6: Residential Agreement

The unit or dwelling is a specific physical place that can be owned, rented or occupied under a legally enforceable agreement by the individual receiving services, and the individual has, at a minimum, the same responsibilities and protections from eviction that tenants have under the landlord/tenant law of the State, county, city or other designated entity. For settings in which landlord/tenant laws do not apply, the State must ensure that a lease, residency agreement or other form of written agreement will be in place for each participant and that the document provides protections that address eviction processes and appeals comparable to those provided under the jurisdiction's landlord/tenant law.

Federal Requirement #7: Privacy

- 1. Each individual has privacy in his/her sleeping or living unit:
- 2. Units have entrance doors lockable by the individual, with only appropriate staff having keys to doors as needed.
- 3. Individuals sharing units have a choice of roommates in that setting.
- 4. Individuals have the freedom to furnish and decorate their sleeping or living units within the lease or other agreement.

Federal Requirement #8: Schedule and Access to Food

Individuals have the freedom and support to control their own schedules and activities, and have access to food at any time.

Federal Requirement #9: Right to Visitors

Individuals are able to have visitors of their choosing at any time.

Federal Requirement #10: Accessibility

The setting is physically accessible to the individual.

Regional center vendors may receive funding to make changes to service settings and/or programs to enhance current services through individualized service delivery. To be considered for funding, vendors must complete and submit this form to the regional center with which it has primary vendorization.

Maywood Manor LLC operates as a licensed adult residential facility for six (6) developmentally disabled individuals with medical and behavioral needs. The objective of the facility is to encourage individuals utilize their full potentials by supporting them to avail community resources of their choice and encourage independence. The facility was chosen to be part of the VSA (virtual site assessment) on June 24,2021. In preparation for the VSA, Administrator went for a Person Centered Thinking Training and had an introductory knowledge on how to use the person-centered approach to service. Several meetings were provided to the individuals and staff about the concept of Person-centered approach, discussed individual rights and the opportunities to make choices. As a result of these meetings, we have ruled out that the facility is out of compliance in terms of not giving individuals enough opportunities to explore available resources of their interest and their desire for volunteer and employment opportunities. Some of these individuals expressed their desire to regularly attend classes offered at Santa Clara Recreational Center every Friday. One individual would like to volunteer during Sunday service at the local parish church and he has the desire to work at Home Depot. He used to have paid employment while attending Day program prior to Covid. He misses his job and is asking the facility to support him to explore employment opportunities.

Subsequently, DSPs have not received adequate and appropriate training on person-centered planning/thinking approach to providing service.

The ID team which include the individuals and their circle of support have identified areas needing improvement. These areas that we identify will assist Maywood Manor LLC to be in compliance with HCBS rules.

 - 1. Request for one (1) vehicle 2022 Sienna XLE minivan.

Maywood Manor currently has only one (1) minivan that is utilized by all individuals for medical appointments and community outings. This limits the staff ability to take individuals to their chosen activity since planned or emergency medical appointments take precedence regarding vehicle usage. Because of this, individuals cannot always access preferred activities of choice since they all need to share a vehicle. The request for additional van will allow individualized access to social, recreational activities, volunteer work and explore employment opportunities while taking into consideration the required and needed medical appointments of other individuals.

2. <u>Train-the -trainer Certification and Staff Training in Peron-Centered</u> Planning/Thinking and HCBS Rules.

Maywood Manor LLC is also requesting for a grant for the Administrator and Facility Manager to undergo a Train-the trainer Certification and staff training. With the knowledge from this training, management will be able to modify current ISP objectives in line with the HCBS required documentation. This extensive training will also educate the staff and provide clear understanding of the HCBS Final rule requirements and enhance service that is individualized and result driven.

Overall, these requests will assist Maywood Manor LLC to improve the quality of life of the individuals served through increase community integration, providing support to exercise their individual rights, encourage them to make choices and live a productive and meaningful life.

 - 1. With the additional vehicle, Maywood Manor LLC will be able to support individuals to go different places, explore the resources available and exercise their freedom to make a choice. With all these opportunities provided to them, these individuals will be able to achieve a more productive life. The more that they consistently able to integrate in the community, their presence will be accepted by the greater community. They will be able to use and enhance their full potential and live a normal life. All the activities will be tracked down daily and will be reported during meetings with the interdisciplinary team on a quarterly basis.
 - 2. With the Train-the -trainer, it will provide staff knowledg on the proper implementation of person-centered services to all the individuals served at Maywood Manor. In order to achieve this, there will be continuous training to current staff through in-service training as well as to new hires. Individuals served will be asked on the services provided to them by the staff on a regular basis. This will also be tracked down through staff attendance during training and recorded in the staff folder.

Group meetings were conducted with the individuals, administrator and staff to share information about HCBS rules, resources available in the community and assess current needs and encourage the individuals to express areas they need support with.

Daily communication with the individuals also allowed them to express their needs, desire and dreams in life. Their needs and goals were reviewed by the interdisciplinary team which includes their circle of support. These provided the rationale for the concept that is being proposed for grant funding.

- 1. This will allow the facility to upgrade the current service through personalized approach and goal driven. This will also encourage the individuals to utilize their full potentials and contribute to the community through volunteerism and paid employment.
- 2. Maywood Manor LLC believes that training is at the heart of person-centered services, both for staff and for the individuals we serve. Understanding the concept of person centered is the key to successful implementation and this will be achieved by having the Administrator and Facility manager gain valuable and comprehensive knowledge of the concept to share to the staff, the individuals and their circle of support. The purpose is to modify existing ISP objectives based on the required HCBS documentation, encourage individuals to achieve their goals, provide support in order for them to have a meaningful and satisfying life.
