





COMMON SAFETY NET ACRONYMS

CAST	 Crisis Assessment Stabilization Teams (CAST) State-operated mobile crisis services
ССН	 Community Crisis Homes (CCH) Residential facilities that provide 24-hour non-medical care to adults & children w/ developmental disabilities (DD) in need of crisis intervention services
HDO	 Housing Developer Organization (HDO) "Buy It Once" model where the HDO owns the property for the restricted use by regional center consumers.
IMD	 Institutions for Mental Disease (IMD) Residential facilities with 16 or more beds used to treat mental illness & receive medical/ nursing care; considered a highly restrictive setting
PDC-STP	 Porterville Developmental Center (PDC) Secure Treatment Program (STP) The STP serves individuals who are committed for placement through the criminal justice system.
STAR Homes	 Stabilization Training Assistance Reintegration (STAR) Serves children/adolescents (7-17 yrs old) & adults (18+ yrs old) receiving regional center services in need of time-limited crisis stabilization services for up to 13 months
START Program	 Systemic, Therapeutic, Assessment, Resources and Treatment (START) Serves individuals aged 6+ residing in-home & out-of-home w/person-centered, trauma-informed, evidence-based, positive supports
DE/SP Homes	 Delayed Egress Secured Perimeter (DE/SP) For consumers determined to require enhancement to staff supervision with delayed egress devices & secured perimeters (locked fence/gate around the home)



Sexualized behavior	12%	13%
Suicidality concerns	31%	23%



DATA OVERVIEW – STAR HOMES

Post-STAR Transitions Since 2019


- STAR has transitioned 67 individuals to community homes
- Among those who transitioned, 88% of individuals remained in the homes they transitioned to
 - 12% experienced a crisis after moving & had to move to a higher level of care
- Among those who went into crisis and moved to a higher level of care
 - 88% experienced those crises within the first 3 months post-STAR
 - 12% within the 4th-6th month post-STAR
