Project Summary: The objective of Year 2 of Protecting and Strengthening Tribal Families with Developmental Disabilities Project is to educate and empower tribal leaders and tribal representatives (social workers, TANF employees, head start staff, etc.) to increase access to intellectual and developmental disability (IDD) services for tribal families involved in child welfare by creating materials, providing statewide trainings, and building relationships between Regional Centers (RCs) and tribal communities. The project will provide statewide trainings related to service access, the RC system (including how tribal service providers can become vendors and caretakers within the RC system), consumer advocacy, culturally appropriate services, and developmental disabilities within the realm of child welfare. The project will engage with the 21 RCs and tribal nations in California. The project will increase the knowledge of tribal leaders, tribal justice systems and child welfare systems on topics relating to the intersection of Indian children with IDD in state and tribal child welfare cases. The project will also create model tools on how to deploy best practices in leveraging RC services in child welfare case planning. The program will build upon materials developed in the first year (2021-22) of the project so tribal leaders and representatives can better serve tribal families navigating IDD services and child welfare systems.

Applicant Response:

CTFC was established in 2017 by tribal leaders to provide a strong and unified voice on behalf of tribal children. The organization was initially formed to implement the comprehensive findings of the California ICWA Compliance Task Force. CTFC now works with member tribes to work on key legislation, train stakeholders, improve policy, and be present in courtrooms in state ICWA cases. Our mission is to promote and protect the health, safety and welfare of tribal children and families, which are inherent tribal governmental functions and are at the core of tribal sovereignty and tribal governance. CTFC has managed a number of statewide projects, one solely focused on early intervention in tribal communities, and has proven to be successful in engaging key stakeholders (e.g. tribal leaders, tribal social workers and CDSS) to achieve program objectives. Applicant Response:

In FY 2021-22, we were funded both through an SAE grant and another related intellectual and developmental disability project. We are now a little over halfway through Year 1 of both projects and to date, we have conducted five (5) tribal listening sessions, launched the 1st Annual California Indian Disability Symposium, and drafted five (5) different sets of curriculum aimed at training Regional Centers (RCs) about engaging with tribal communities and at tribal leaders and social workers about how to connect tribal families to RC services. Because of the relationships between tribal communities and RCs we are building and awareness about available services we are raising, we know of at least six (6) new trainings that RCs held in tribal communities that they had never engaged in before. Additionally, we have started making changes in our own legal practice in state dependency cases governed by the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA). For example, because we are building our internal capacity and knowledge on the topic of IDDs and Regional Centers, we have connected four (4) families with a total of eight tribal member children (because of sibling connections) involved in child welfare cases with getting assessments – they are now going through the process of determining eligibility for RC services. Recommending RC assessments did not used to be a part of our regular practice or trainings, and now it is. We have engaged with at least 31 tribal communities in Year 1 of the projects and six (6) RCs.

This builds on our current project by including 2 former and adding 2 new activities. Our IDD work in 2021-22 included hosting listening sessions and building relationships between tribes and RCs. Lessons learned through that work were twofold – tribal representatives need more training on how 1) to help tribal families access IDD services; and 2) tribal service providers can become vendors or certified caretakers. Proposed changes to address these two lessons include:

- 1) Build on Year 1 Activity 4 curriculum by developing model documents to be used to improve access to RC services in child welfare and train up to 5 new tribal communities. We propose this because we heard that having model documents would expedite the process for tribal social workers to change practice immediately.
- 2) Maintain, update, and make a publicly searchable database building on the database established in Year 1 Activity 1. We propose to continue this activity in Year 2 because we heard from tribes and RCs it would be useful in case planning and outreach and engagement.
- 3) Work with tribal communities and tribal caretakers to become vendors/certified and create an online training module that other tribal service providers and caretakers can follow. We propose this because we heard in Year 1 that even if children qualify for services, they often cannot access because of transportation. However, some tribes and caretakers already offer services. If we increase local vendors and caretakers, tribal members who reside far from a RC location, could still access services. We also know respite care is the service most needed by Native RC consumers. If caretakers from the community were certified and could provide respite care through the RC, families could stay closer to home and improve quality of life.
- 4) Continue and expand the 2nd Annual California Indian Disability Symposium so it includes training about services for ages 3+.

CTFC regularly trains and hosts events in tribal communities, so once we have developed the curriculum and internal capacity, we will be able to continue the project by including trainings in existing events. We will also continue spreading awareness through a myriad of platforms including statewide ICWA conferences, CDSS Office of Tribal Affair meetings, and through CTFC's website, social media, newsletters and mailers. CTFC has a variety of funding streams with tribal donations and contract work being the largest contributors to our operations budget. While grant funding is needed for the first several years of the project to establish infrastructure, because we started relationship building and training in at least 31 tribal communities in Year 1 of our DDS projects, we are confident we will be able to fundraise and source other funding to continue the project when grant funding has concluded because tribes are invested in seeing the work continue for such an important population.

Applicant Response:

California Tribal Families Coalition is uniquely equipped to provide education and training to tribal communities and to develop a statewide 'best practice' model for how tribal representatives and tribal justice systems can improve access for tribal families to IDD services. CTFC's sole mission is to promote and protect the health, safety, and welfare of tribal children and families. While we have primarily worked towards this mission in the field of child welfare, this project now provides the opportunity to improve the child welfare system in a new way – by increasing system knowledge about IDD services that so many Indian children involved in child welfare desperately need.

CTFC is a statewide tribal organization that represents almost half of all tribes in California. The organization was founded by and continues to be driven by a board of directors comprised entirely of duly elected tribal leaders. All members of CTFC's staff have dedicated their careers to helping and serving tribal communities with combined experience of 92 years of service in Indian Country.

The Protecting and Strengthening Tribal Families with Developmental Disabilities Project will educate and empower tribal leaders and tribal representatives (social workers, TANF employees, head start staff, etc.) to increase access to intellectual and developmental disability (IDD) services for tribal families involved in child welfare by creating materials, providing statewide trainings, and building relationships between Regional Centers (RCs) and tribal communities.

The program will build upon materials developed in the first year (2021-22) of the project so tribal leaders and representatives can better serve tribal families navigating IDD services and child welfare systems.

Applicant Response:

According to RC POS data reports for RCs in 2019, Natives make up less than 1% of consumers served. We do not have clear data about how many Natives in CA have an IDD, but Native people nationally have disproportionately higher rates of disabilities generally. Additionally, according to the DDS *Background and Process for Developing Disparity Measures* published in March 2019 in FY 2015/16, average POS expenditures were \$11,952 for consumers who identify with a racial/ethnic group other than White, while POS expenditures for White consumers averaged \$22,140. That paired with the fact that there is little Native specific data available within the DDS system because Natives are lumped into the "Other" category in most DDS performance measures, we can infer that Native families are going underserved by the system. CTFC also conducted a survey in 2019 to gather information from tribal leaders and tribal social workers. Based on survey responses and interviews, we designed this project to address the biggest areas of concern (e.g. lack of education and resources) through education and training. This Year 2 proposal is also based on feedback we received in Year 1 of our DDS-related work. We held 5 listening sessions and had numerous conversations with tribal representatives about what more is needed to improve access to services in their communities. This proposal builds upon the trainings we are creating and piloting in Year 1.

3. Applicant Question: Uniqueness

Applicant Response:

After reviewing the list of recently funded DDS projects, we found this proposed project to be unique in the systems-change approach we are taking to address the issue of inequity in access and barriers to services in tribal communities through educating tribal leaders, tribal representatives and tribal justice systems. Additionally, no other funded programs have developed advocacy and training tools designed exclusively for tribal communities to promote best practice in developing model child welfare guidance tools for tribal children with IDDs. While the proposal is similar and builds on our other DDS funded work aimed at increasing education around Tribal Early Start, this proposal is distinct and separate as it focuses on a tribal youth population aged 3+ and on those tribal children involved in child welfare, allowing us to provide education and training on the full spectrum of tribal RC consumers.

The project will provide tribal leaders, tribal representatives, and tribal justice systems with education and advocacy tools so they have the knowledge needed to identify tribal families who have, or are at risk of having, intellectual or developmental disabilities, and the system knowledge necessary to access them. Often, tribal families are underserved by state systems because the system, and folks working in the system, lack the knowledge and experience needed to effectively serve and engage tribal families and tribes. This project will leverage CTFC's trusted standing within tribal communities around the state to ensure maximum tribal input and engagement are used to inform RC services and outreach.

Applicant Response:

This project supports the RC's plan to promote equity and reduce disparities in their catchment areas by addressing some of the most reported barriers: lack of understanding about developmental and intellectual disabilities, lack of understanding of the RC system and services, and the lack of understanding the eligibility criteria and the appeal process. The project will accomplish this by providing education and training to perhaps the RCs most underserved population, tribal families. The project will collaborate with tribal social service departments, tribal justice systems, and state courts who all serve tribal children with IDDs in the child welfare system.

The schedule of activities is designed to ensure maximum tribal community engagement and input as well as the development of critical relationships with RCs, all of which will be used in the development of grant activity deliverables and provision of trainings and listening sessions. All grant activities demonstrate steps towards providing the tribal communities with the education they need in order to understand RC functions, increasing the likelihood of better access and equity of service for tribal families. CTFC will measure completion of proposed activities including, the number of educational materials developed, the number of trainings provided, and the number of tribal service providers engaged in project activities. To measure the effectiveness of these activities on increasing issue awareness and advocacy confidence, CTFC will conduct pre and post surveys with providers trained and engaged that measure the reported increase in advocacy confidence and issue awareness. By gathering data and documenting narratives about successes throughout the program, CTFC intends to measure the effect of the increased knowledge and confidence in the number of tribal providers that report increased discussion of screening and referral with families, state courts, and state child welfare systems. CTFC will measure the number of tribal providers trained that report increased referrals to regional center services. CTFC will also analyze available regional center purchase of service demographic data pre and post project (dependent on publicly available regional center data) to further measure the project's effectiveness in reaching the objective.
