Special Needs Network, Inc. (SNN) is a non-profit grassroots organization responding to the crisis of autism and other developmental disabilities in underserved communities. We recognize the intersectionality of individuals with disabilities and that their fight for disability rights is inextricably tied to the fight for racial justice and the civil rights of all people. SNN Provides a myriad of programs which include; parent advocacy training, legislative advocacy, and direct service through inclusive summer camps, and behavior therapy. Our proposed project is a referral program with the Los Angeles County Foster Care Pediatric Hub for behavioral services. SNN has been promoting awareness of developmental disabilities for 18 years, in order to insure that the diagnosis gap is lessened between children of color and their white peers. The outcomes for the proposed project are in line with all of our previous work - access to service for all.

Our previously funded Stepping Stones program continues to hit all its benchmarks. The outreach and recruitment of the 0-5 population continues to strive and grow. To date over 100 parents have participated in our signature PAM advocacy training, and we have also hit benchmarks in children who have now entered into direct behavior services with SNN.

In July SNN co-hosted a workshop with CalABLE around the impact of how health is impacted based on economic circumstances. Individuals with disabilities shared how a CalABLE account could help pull individuals out of the "poverty cycle" many of our people with disabilities face due to financial savings limitations which in turn impact workability.

As we plan for our fall series of PAM in October, the SNN Programs team has held several meetings with and attended Parent meetings with community-based organizations serving preschool and school-aged children to raise awareness on the trainings and our community relationships as a supportive bridge to vital special needs and other family resources. We are working with our Regional Center Family Resource Centers at SCLARC, Westside, and Harbor to build on collaborative parent education strategies that will effect more and better service access by our families of color, specifically targeting the 0-5 families.

Project Summary and Organizational Experience

Due to delays in eligibility evaluations and some confusion about the reimbursement process for non-managed care foster patients, Special Needs Network is prepared to establish a pilot referral program, partnering with the County of Los Angeles. As Special Needs Network prepares to open its Center for Autism and Developmental Disabilities (C.A.A.D) this winter on the campus of Martin Luther King Hospital in the Watts/Willowbrook area of South Los Angeles, we have begun to collaborate with fellow tenants in the Jacqueline Avant Children and Family Center. This is the new modular building we will be moving into in December 2022. The agency who will be one floor up from our space is the Los Angeles County Medical Hub for Foster Youth. After discussions with Dr. Janet Arnold-Clark, MD, who is the director of the hub, it has been established that a seamless and efficient referral program is necessary to ensure that SNN can provide behavioral health treatment to these children in the same building where they receive their pediatric care.

The Need

- Solve the reimbursement process for service between 'fee for service" and managed care to ensure a seamless process. (See Uploaded Document)
- Navigating the systems of care and insurance is an arduous task for families.
- Advocacy training for this population is essential to navigate the complex insurance system and its relation to regional care services.
- Delays in diagnosis and treatment for autism and other related developmental disabilities is detrimental to the development of this kids.

The Solution

- Establish a pilot referral program with the Los Angeles County Foster Care Hub.
- The pilot will aim to identify 50 kids through the Regional Center process and get them in service.
- Health promotors and advocates will take on a case load of families to navigate them through the system.
- Foster families will participate in a cohort of Special Needs Network's flagship Parent Advocacy Mentor Program (PAM)
- Specialized trauma-trained SNN clinicians will serve this unique population.
- Evaluators will follow families through the process, and track progress and outcomes.

Experience

Special Needs Network has over 18 years of experience working with the developmentally disabled community. One of our organizational priorities since our inception has been to eliminate the diagnosis gap between children of color and their white counterparts. This project continues on that path and focuses on the very specific foster care population. According to the Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services, there are 28,196 children currently in the foster care system. One of the largest age groups in the system is the 0-5 group. We are determined with the help of the pediatric foster care hub, to identify children children with potential disabilities in that age range and up to 12 years old and get them into behavioral treatment asap.

Applicant Response:

The decision to address the needs of the foster care population was simple. After the discovery that the process for identification, evaluation, and treatment of these children is so arduous after discussions with both regional center representatives, DHCS, and the LA County Pediatric Hub, it was beyond evident that there is a disparity issue that needs to be addressed. Although our project is specific to our services, we hope that solving the issue will lead to a system-wide impact and more streamline referral and reimbursement process for foster care patients throughout the state.

Applicant Response:

The proposed referral program is unique in a couple of ways. First and foremost, this is a program that is in partnership with a local county agency. We are in a unique circumstance as mentioned in our project summary where we will be in the same building as our partner and look to bridge our services to create a compliment of options for these families under one roof. With over 60,000 children in Foster care in California, we are confident that this project will also lead to state-wide impact as we prepare a training curriculum for other foster care hubs to utilize.

This project through a robust program that will include health promotors, highly trained and experienced advocates, and culturally-sensitive clinical providers, will measurably improve equity to access for patients in the foster care system that have or potentially have a developmental disability. Once the referral and reimbursement process is standardized, and patients are identified, parents will participate in a specialized cohort of our Parent Advocacy mentor Program. An intense 6- lesson training that not only shows them how to successfully navigate the systems of care, but also addresses other issues including their own mental health, mentoring others in their social groups, and sitting on boards at regional centers or other public entities, and participating in legislative advocacy.

This project absolutely supports the regional center's plan tp promote equity and disparities. The foster care population in LA County is 60.4% Hispanic, and 23.9% Black. These are disproportionately high numbers for communities that traditionally have to battle systemic racism in the systems of care. The added disadvantage of being foster families with obstacles to service exacerbates an already difficult landscape to maneuver.
