2024 PART C GRANT APPLICATION PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

The Department of Developmental Services (DDS), as lead agency for Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), Part C, applies annually for the Part C Grant. This federal grant program assists states in operating a comprehensive statewide program of early intervention services for infants and toddlers (birth to three years of age) with disabilities and their families. The application, submitted each May, applies to the upcoming State budget period (beginning July 1st through June 30th of each year).

The 2024 Part C Grant Application has been posted on the DDS website for public comment according to federal requirements. DDS will accept public input on the 2024 Part C Grant application beginning March 21, 2024, through May 20, 2024. Comments on the application will be summarized by DDS and forwarded to the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP).

Persons submitting comments on specific items in the application should identify the item, referenced by the page number, and indicate support, opposition, suggested changes, additions or deletions pertaining to the specific item. Input will be considered if received by **May 20, 2024**.

DEAF & HARD OF HEARING RESOURCES

<u>LEAD-K Family Services</u> functions as the current Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) program in California. Lead-K's centralized services focus on connecting families with their local school district, Early Start home visit teachers, parent mentors, Deaf coaches and other supports as outlined in an Individualized Family Support Plan.

Language First aims to educate and raise awareness about American Sign Language (ASL)/English bilingualism and the importance of a strong first language foundation for Deaf and hard of hearing (DHH) children.

RESOURCES FOR MILITARY FAMILIES

The Cerebral Palsy Guide: Veteran resources for families with special needs.

FAMILY RESOURCE CENTERS NETWORK OF CALIFORNIA (FRCNCA)

The Access to Care Family Survey

The Family Resource Center Network of California (FRCNCA) helped to facilitate the distribution of the Access to Care Family Survey, a collaborative effort funded by the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. The collaborative effort involved researchers from University of California San Francisco (UCSF), Tali Klima from Practical Research Solutions, Children's Specialty Care Coalition (CSCC), and California Children's Hospital Association (CCHA).

Through the FRCNCA and individual Family Resource Centers (FRCs), the survey reached caregivers whose children had recent specialty care appointments. With 646 responses statewide, the survey captured diverse experiences. The findings will inform advocacy efforts by the Children's Specialty Care Coalition in 2024 to enhance access to services for children and families with chronic health conditions.

DARBY'S LEGACY

On August 21, 2017, Darby Jean was born with Trisomy 13 (Patau Syndrome). Her syndrome led to medical complications and developmental delays. With Spring being around the corner, getting your family member out in the community will be fun and helps develop their social skills. Here are some ideas on the benefits of getting them involved in different social programs.



California Children's Services (CCS) Program

The state of California CCS program provides additional services for children, under age 21, who have CCS eligible medical conditions. Common examples of eligible conditions include sickle cell anemia, hemophilia, and aplastic anemia. Search for your <u>local CCS</u> office.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Program

The WIC program is available for women (pregnant, breastfeeding, post-partum) and children up to five years old may qualify. For tips on good nutrition practices and eligibility requirements visit <u>California WIC</u>.
