JULY WAS FRAGILE X AWARENESS MONTH

Fragile X syndrome (FXS) is a genetic disorder and one of the most common causes of inherited intellectual disability. While there can be similar traits or tendencies between individuals with FXS, people living with FXS have varying levels of support needs that should be considered for each individual person. People living with FXS have many strengths. For example, some people may have a great sense of humor, some may have incredible memories, and some may be very loyal friends.



America the Beautiful: The National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Access Pass

Children with permanent disabilities can get a free lifetime pass to visit the National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands. The pass is called the Access Pass and is offered to U.S. citizens and permanent residents who have physical, mental, or sensory challenges. To apply for the pass, you need to have documentation that proves permanent disability. The pass also allows caregivers to enter the parks for free when accompanying the child.
