Performance Report for Tri-Counties Regional Center

Every year, the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) contracts with regional centers in California to serve individuals and families. And, every year DDS looks at how well the regional centers are doing. This report will give you information about your regional center.

Last year, at Tri-Counties Regional Center (TCRC) we served about 19,420 individuals. The charts on page two tell you about the individuals we serve. You'll also see how well we are doing in meeting our goals and in fulfilling our contract with DDS.

At TCRC, we want to improve every year, do better than the state average, and meet or exceed the DDS standard. As you can see in this report, we did well in areas including:

- Fewer people living in developmental centers
- More children live with families than the state average
- More adults live in home settings
- CDERs and ESRs are updated as required

But, we still need to improve in:

- Reducing the number of adults living in large facilities
- IPP (Individualized Family Service Plan) requirements are met



Who uses TCRC?

How well is TCRC performing?

This chart tells you five areas where DDS wants each regional center to keep improving.

The first column tells you how TCRC was doing last reporting period, and the second column shows how TCRC was doing at the end of fiscal year 2024.

What about other performance areas?

- Communities of Practice was held in 2024 on a quarterly basis across all seven TCRC offices, focusing on skills related to Person Centered Planning: Planning Team Meeting Facilitation, Supported Decision Making, Community Mapping and Risk Planning
- The California Gathering was held in April, with over 220 people in attendance to share learning about person centered planning.
- TCRC brochure "Other Resources in the Community" was updated, to be distributed to all offices.
- TCRC developed training for all staff in response to areas of improvement identified in the Individual and Family Satisfaction Survey.
- Enhanced Service Coordination Team is fully staffed and serves 118 families.
- Developed Self Determination Program flier and shared with families at annual planning team meeting.

- Provided Implicit Bias training to TCRC all staff.
- Provided Cultural Humility in-person training to all staff, online training sessions continue.
- Certified three PCT Trainers and have enrolled three additional candidates.
- Utilized HCBS funding per stakeholder input to support seven individuals from six different providers in obtaining ACRE Certification with an emphasis in Customized Employment.
- Utilized HCBS funding to offer trainings on Person-Centered employment to 150 individuals.
- Utilized HCBS funding to create an HCBS Final Rule animation series to support the regional center system, providers, families and individuals we serve.
