





CONTEXT: CALIFORNIA SSIP HISTORY

- First plan cycle: 2015-2020, extended two years
- **SiMR:** Child outcome statement 1: significant growth in social-emotional outcomes for all children aged 0 to 2
 - Having received at least six months of El services through Early Start
- Variety of improvement strategies and activities
 - "Take a Minute" campaign
 - Options for Regional Centers to choose approach to improving outcomes

ORIGINAL THEORY OF ACTION

If DDS...


- Educates parents and providers,
- Implements evidence-based training strategies,
- Partners to disseminate information,
- Improves the measurement of progress of child outcomes, and
- Increases peer review and collaboration,

Then:

- Families will receive the education and support necessary to fully engage in their child's social/emotional development through the parent-child relationship, and
- Local systems will competently and consistently implement evidence-based practices,

AND THEN...there will be more infants and toddlers with IFSPs exiting Early Start who substantially increased their rate of growth in social-emotional development.

WHO IS INVOLVED?

Three avenues for public engagement:

- Multi-constituency Advisory Group
- Targeted constituency conversations
- Public awareness and information sharing

Advisory Group

- **Purpose**: provide the Leadership Team feedback on key decisions, including the SiMR, theory of action, plan design, and outcomes, representing the needs of broad constituencies and the state as a whole
- Role: engage in deep discussion and consideration of potentialities, including strengths and weaknesses of various choices, to recommend future action

Constituent Groups


- **Purpose**: provide the Leadership Team feedback from targeted constituencies that reflects a broader diversity of perspectives
- **Role**: consider recommendations from the Advisory Group and Early Start and reflect on effects of recommendations for all constituents


CHILD OUTCOMES

Child demonstrates:

- A. Positive socialemotional skills
- B. Acquisition and use of knowledge and skills
- C. Use of appropriate behaviors to meet needs



FAMILY OUTCOMES



Families report that the program helped them:

- A. Know their rights
- B. Effectively communicate their children's needs
- C. Help their children develop and learn

CHILD OUTCOMES: WHAT IS MEASURED

Two summary statements for each outcome:


- Of those children who entered or exited the program below age expectations in each outcome, the percent who substantially increased their rate of growth by program exit.
- The percent of children who were functioning within age expectations in each outcome by program exit.

Social-Emotional Development - Outcome A




Blue line indicates targets

Demonstrating Growth (SS1)

Annually, California is...


- A. Just **above** national average of ~65%
- B. 5-7% **above** national average of ~70%
- C. 15% **below** national average of 70%

Within Age Expectations (SS2)

Annually, California is 6–12% **above** the national average on each measure (Outcomes A, B, C) National averages:

- A. 52%
- B. 42%
- C. 52%

STATE DATA COMPLETENESS PERCENTAGES






FAMILY OUTCOMES: DETAILS

States have some flexibility:

- Sampling is permitted
- Can select among 3 surveys or develop their own
- Can choose who gets the survey
 - Such as: all families; all families with 3 months of service; at program exit; etc.
- Sampling plans must be submitted and approved by OSEP
- Results' representativeness must be analyzed and reported

FAMILY OUTCOMES DATA & TARGETS






In FFY 2021, California was 8– 12% **below** the national average for each of the three family outcomes, which were all close to 91%.

Early Start helped them know their rights






Outcome B

Early Start helped them communicate their children's needs






Outcome C

IMPROVEMENT FOCUS FOR THE SSIP

Child outcomes:

- 1. Positive social-emotional skills
- 2. Acquisition and use of knowledge and skills
- 3. Use of appropriate behaviors to meet needs

Family outcomes:

- 1. Know their rights
- 2. Effectively communicate their children's needs
- 3. Help their children develop and learn

Where should California Early Start focus its improvement efforts?

ADVISORY GROUP POLLING

- Child Outcomes:
 - Preference to improve social-emotional skills
 - 9/14 respondents (64%)
 - 7/8 constituents (87%)
- Family Outcomes:
 - Preference to improve capacity to help families help their children develop and learn
 - 9/14 respondents (64%)
 - 12 of 14 recommended one or more of the 3 outcomes
